 VSP warns of IRS phone scam, caller ID 'spoofing'

RICHMOND — The Virginia State Police on Friday issued a warning of an ongoing phone scam where the caller claims to be an Internal Revenue Service representative and demands payment using verbal threats and intimidation.

The VSP said the caller I.D. number used by the scam is a legitimate VSP area office phone number, and the VSP has received numerous calls concerning the scam in recent

In each scam call reported to the VSP, the caller is described as having a "thick, foreign accent" and identifies himself or herself as working for the IRS.

Trio's tryst triggers tussle in trailer park

• A 911 caller claimed his shoes and phone had been stolen on Oak Street, with the suspect described as "tall and skinny, Brotherhood tats on his face." He also reportedly had a swastika tattoo on one arm.

• An elderly woman told police that after her house and car keys went missing, her former daugh-



ter-in-law latdemanded \$500 for them to be returned. The next day, unknown man arrived at her residence claiming he had "gotten them back

for her but it cost him \$100." He then handed over the keys and instructed that she drive him to the bank to get his payment. She complied, but while doing so explained the situation to a teller, who in turn called police. The male suspect was located in the parking lot and questioned by an officer. The female suspect was later contacted by police at her home, where she stated, "I don't have to answer any of your questions." She then shut the front door. No charges were immediately filed, with the incident categorized as extortion.

Artist brings Australian culture to Kingsport school



KINGSPORT — Jefferson Elementary students didgeridooed their way into Australian culture this past week and played, sang, danced and boomeranged as they explored the Aboriginal and European heritage of the land down under.

Artist, educator and didgeridoo player Paul Taylor, an Australian native who lives in Wyoming but returns to his native land two months a year to visit, teach and study with

an Aboriginal elder, was an artist in residence at the Kingsport elementary school thanks to funding from the Jefferson Parent Teacher Organization with help from local Home Depot, Lowe's and Walmart stores.

"I go all over. I teach in Australia, too," Taylor said after the first of two performances of students, during which he would get them to quieten down by



saying "cooee," an Aboriginal bush call for attention. "I teach my culture (in Australia), too. They're not learning it, either.'

Taylor came for one day last school year and was such a hit that the PTO brought him back for a week. Third-grade students made boomerangs and demonstrated them, while fifth-graders made didgeridoos from donated PVC pipe and performed with them. Fourth-graders made

bullroarers. Students in first, second, third and fourth grades danced, and kindergarten students sang the "Kookaburra Song" and "Give Me a Home." The school of 475 students was split into roughly equal-sized morning and afternoon performances Friday in the school gym. They also danced.

Hawkins drug dealer sentenced to 30 years

GREENEVILLE — Notorious Hawkins County drug trafficker Gregory Harold Moore was sentenced to 30 years in federal prison Friday in Greeneville in exchange for previous

guilty pleas related to dealing large quantities of meth and pills as well as threatening an informant.

Moore, 47, of Surgoinsville, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge R. Leon Jordan following guilty pleas for conspiracies to distribute meth, hydrocodone, oxycodone and oxymor-

Moore also pled conspiracy to threat-

en bodily injury to a person in retaliation for suspected cooperation with law enforcement and engaging in intimidating, threatening to influence or prevent testimony, and possession of a firearm in furtherance of a drug trafficking offense.

According to prosecutors, Moore admitted that between May 2015 and August 2015 he sold an approximate total of two ounces of meth spread out over four separate occasions to an individual working with law enforcement.

In August 2015, Moore told this individual that he could provide three ounces of meth the next time they met (and currently had two ounces of the

A federal search warrant was executed at Moore's Surgoinsville residence, at which time authorities seized
